Mayor Dina Long 2016 New Year Message Borough of Sea Bright Reorganization Meeting January 2, 2016

Good afternoon. Thank you so much for taking time out of your busy schedules to be with us today. We are honored to have so many residents, loved ones and elected representatives here with us today.

Before I start, I'd like to take a moment to especially recognize and thank the good men and women who work for the Borough of Sea Bright, our Police, the staff who work in this building or on the library or on the beach, our DPW, and our volunteer departments. Since Sandy, each one of us has had our own issues that we are trying to resolve. So imagine dealing with that times 1000. They are the unsung heroes of our town, and they should know all of us up here see when they go above and beyond, which is often, we appreciate it, and we are grateful for their efforts.

I also want to recognize the extraordinary service of the Borough Council. They are the ones working behind the scenes to make Sea Bright better. They have full lives, and yet they give inordinate amounts of time, with no compensation whatsoever, on behalf of our town.

Subsequently, I learned that psychologists recognize four phases of human disaster response. Phase 2, the Honeymoon phase, is known to be when people draw together to solve problems in an intense showing of community. Our so-called Sea Bright Spirit. (By the way, Phase 3, "Disillusionment" follows, ending with a Phase 4, "Reconstruction" phase.)

Alright, so maybe we were not all that unique, but it certainly was special, and that Sea Bright Spirit was real. Looking back, I see how important a role that mindset played in our initial recovery.

When we were grateful, abundance came. When we radiated positive energy, positive results were the outcome. It's just physics, really, if you think about it. How could you expect to get positive out of negative? Negative produces negative, positive produces positive. It's really that simple.

So, going into my next term as Mayor, and into the new year, the message for me is the power of positive energy. The fact that anything IS possible, and we have the power to make it happen with our mindset.

I do not mean be happy 365, or that we all need to agree, or even that we all like each other. What I do mean is bringing positive energy to the table, treating people how we want to be treated ourselves, making opportunity out of obstacles, and maintaining an attitude of gratitude.
